# World Vision Water Update: February 2018



## World Vision Water 2017 Results

The results are in from World Vision's fiscal year 2017 efforts to provide water, sanitation, and hygiene to the poor in the developing world. While we continue to expand our efforts in Africa, our global footprint now includes many countries in Asia Pacific, Latin America, and the Middle East. The table below shows the results of three of our 33 indicators of impact. You can view our full results in our 19 page annual report here and an updated two page summary of our work here.

#### Summary of World Vision Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Impact from 2017

Water. For our water efforts, we reached 106% of our target by providing clean water access to 3.2 million people. We did this by developing nearly 23,000 water points. As in 2016, we continue to reach one new person with clean water every 10 seconds, making us the top nongovernmental provider of clean water in the developing world. We have now reached 7.8 million people in the first two years of our 5-year commitment. This puts us on track to meet our 2020 commitment to reach 20 million people with clean water between 2016-2020 and our overall goal to reach everyone, everywhere we work by 2030. To help ensure that our water points continue to function, we formed or reactivated 6,605 water committees that take responsibility for the water points. In addition to providing permanent water sources such as boreholes, mechanized water systems, and water pipelines in remote rural areas, we also provided more than 500,000 people with access to municipal water systems through our Syria Response program by rehabilitating areas impacted by the war. We also reached more than 300,000 people with emergency drinking water supplies as part of our East Africa famine response. These municipal and emergency water beneficiaries are not included in the 3.2 million people provided with access to clean water.



<u>Sanitation and Hygiene.</u> In 2016, we highlighted a gap between the number of people reached with clean water and those reached with dignified sanitation and hygiene behavior change promotion. Because safe sanitation and hygiene are equally important to reducing waterborne illness, our teams rededicated themselves to reducing this gap. As shown in the table above, in 2017, we eliminated this gap by reaching 3.3 million people with household sanitation and 3.9 million people with hygiene behavior-change programming. We also provided water and sanitation facilities to half a million children in schools and hand-washing facilities to nearly 750,000 children in schools. In addition, due to our sanitation efforts, 5,130 communities were certified as open defecation free.

Thank you to our donors and partners who helped make these results possible and have helped us transform the lives of literally millions of people.
