Elimination of Trachoma in Ghana

The World Health Organization (WHO) has recently announced that Ghana has become the first African country to eliminate trachoma, the leading cause of infectious blindness. By providing clean water sources and improving hygiene and sanitation, World Vision, working with the Conrad N Hilton Foundation and other partners, has played a role in this remarkable achievement. Thanks to the many pioneers within World Vision's water program and our many donors and partners who have been part of this 25-year effort. We Know How to Save Lives

World Vision knows how to save lives. That's a powerful statement. The ability to save lives at a large scale is humbling and carries with it a responsibility to do as much as you can and as quickly as you can. In this newsletter, we'll focus on our life-saving efforts to address the East Africa hunger crisis.

Prolonged drought in East Africa led to failed crops and extreme rates of malnutrition in the region. More than 12 million children go to bed hungry across South Sudan, Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya everyday. Nine million children require nutrition assistance to keep them from starving and to prevent irreversible growth stunting and brain underdevelopment.

Malnutrition can be assessed quickly in children by using a special cloth tape-measure wrapped around the middle of their upper arm. The tape-measure has a window that shows colors of green if the child has adequate weight, yellow if there is risk of moderate malnutrition, and red if the child is severely malnourished. Tragically, a severely malnourished child can die quickly because of their low weight and resulting reduced ability to fight infections. If you add contaminated water to the mix, then the situation becomes a death sentence for all too many children.






Thankfully, World Vision is a leader in addressing malnutrition. When we provide nutritional supplements, 9 out of 10 severely malnourished children can recover. Clean water plays a critical role because when we eliminate diarrhea caused by unsafe water, the child can absorb more of the nutrients from the supplement.

I recently traveled to East Africa to see World Vision's response to the current hunger crisis. While it was hard to witness children suffering from malnutrition, I felt heartened by the large number of children we are able to save.

Our donors have responded by helping us respond at a massive scale. Recently, in one month alone, World Vision reached more than one million people in crisis in Kenya, Ethiopia, Somalia, and South Sudan with nutritional supplements for malnourished children, food assistance, income-earning opportunities, and health care assistance.

As part of this effort, in a single month, we provided 259,509 people with clean water, sanitation and hygiene. Whenever possible, World Vision provides permanent water sources so that families have clean water immediately and also have water to withstand future droughts. For example, we have reached more than one million people in drought-affected areas in the last year with permanent water points. Recently, rains have come to much of East Africa, but not in a helpful way, because it came as flooding. More than 700,000 people have been forced from their homes and hundreds of schools have closed. This is impacting the planting season for crops and so the people in East Africa need help in the coming months. As a result, World Vision has issued an emergency appeal for \$65 million. We remain committed to reaching everyone everywhere we work with clean water by 2030, while at the same time, we will work to save lives in these extreme crisis.
