We empower children with knowledge and practical skills to protect themselves and one another.




We strengthen families with parenting skills and social and economic support so they can function as a first line of protection and care for children.



### A community-based, sustainable approach that delivers results

World Vision's decades of experience in child protection programming and the trust brought about by our long-term presence in communities allows us to address harmful cultural norms that condone and perpetuate child labor, child marriage, female genital mutilation, exploitation, trafficking, abuse, and violence. To ensure solutions are appropriate to the local context, we work closely with families, community and faith leaders, and children themselves to identify the issues and then address them holistically.

This community-based approach leads to sustainable impact because it leads to attitude and behavior change. Families and communities are supported in valuing children, nurturing them, and ensuring they are safe. Girls and boys are celebrated equally and their social protection is supported by ensuring they are registered at birth. Children's lives are transformed as they're equipped and empowered to protect themselves and one another and express their opinions in decisions affecting their lives.

This community-based approach applies to all of our child protection programs—including ending female genital mutilation and child marriage through the Kenya Big Dream project, strengthening child protection systems in Honduras, and fighting sex trafficking in India.
