## Progress Report

October 2024–March 2025

SUMMARY

In Honduras, we aim to finish the job of reaching 650,000 people with access to clean water in 49 municipalities by 2028. To date, we have reached 279,325 people, or 43% of our total commitment.

The government has officially confirmed our work is complete in 16 municipalities, meaning that at least 90% of residents can access clean water within 30 minutes of their homes. (For additional detail, see map on page 3.) Following are highlights from the first half of fiscal year 2025:

- Reaching 55,856 people with clean water by constructing or repairing 33 water supply systems across 42 communities. This includes 4,967 children in 61 schools and approximately 23,500 patients and staff at six healthcare facilities.
- Providing 1,930 children with access to sanitation and hygiene facilities in 17 schools. Along with latrine blocks and handwashing stations benefiting all students, menstrual hygiene management rooms now provide girls with a more dignified, comfortable school environment.

- Establishing 86 community water committees and training them to manage water points, establish user fees, and protect the watersheds that supply their communities.

Water + Economic Empowerment  
Midterm Evaluation

In 2022, World Vision commissioned a study to understand how water, sanitation, and hygiene programming, paired with our faith-based economic empowerment model, improves household and child well-being. The midterm evaluation revealed:

- **Study participants spend 32% less time collecting water** than they did two years ago. The reduction in time and frequency may contribute to increased economic empowerment and free time for women and girls.
- **Households have seen a measurable drop in illness among children under five.** Families reported fewer cases of diarrhea in children under five, as well as lower incidences of coughing, vomiting, and fever compared to the control group.



Access to clean water, improved sanitation, and hygiene have a remarkably positive effect on children’s health and well-being by reducing waterborne diseases and respiratory infections, both major causes of death in children under five.

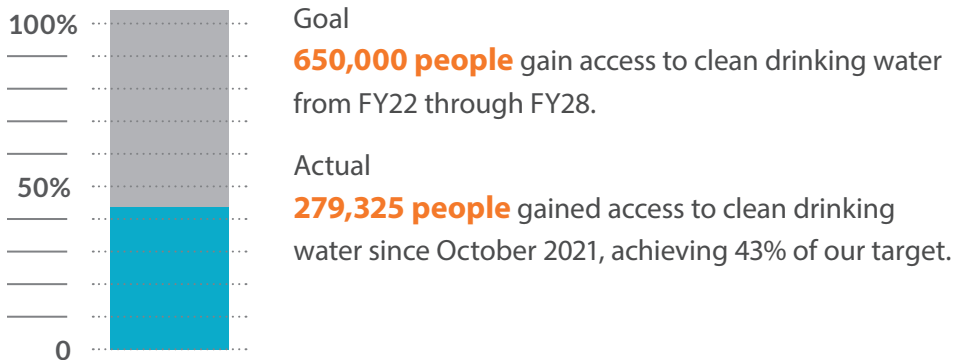


## KEY LEARNINGS

By taking action now, World Vision is helping communities secure their water supply for the future. Here's how:

- **Assessing Water Sources:** Our team conducted an in-depth analysis of local rivers and streams to understand water availability, seasonal changes, and potential risks like droughts or floods. This work will help communities plan wisely and prevent water shortages.
- **Protecting Watersheds:** Partnering with the Forest Conservation Institute, World Vision is training community members to care for more than 100 acres of the El Ocotal watershed, which serves 268 families. Efforts include planting trees, preventing forest fires, monitoring invasive species, and improving sanitation for nearby homes.
- **Monitoring Water Supply:** A real-time tracking system is being tested in three communities, helping local leaders monitor water levels and respond quickly to water shortages or contamination.

## PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

- We will work with a contractor to prepare feasibility studies, topographical surveys, and designs for water systems scheduled to begin in FY26.
- We also will finalize an agreement with the Inter-American Association of Sanitary and Environmental Engineering to provide technical assistance and skills training to our team.

Dania Murillo turns on her faucet and watches clean water flow—something that once felt impossible. Dania, 36, moved from a nearby village to Minitas, hoping for a fresh start. Instead, she faced the same struggle: no access to water. “We had to walk to the river to wash clothes, cook, and sometimes we left our children alone just to go find water.”

Determined to change that reality, Dania and her family joined a community-led effort to bring water home. With support from World Vision, the local government, and neighbors, they helped dig trenches and build the system that would transform their village. Today, thanks to their perseverance, families in Minitas no longer spend hours searching for water.

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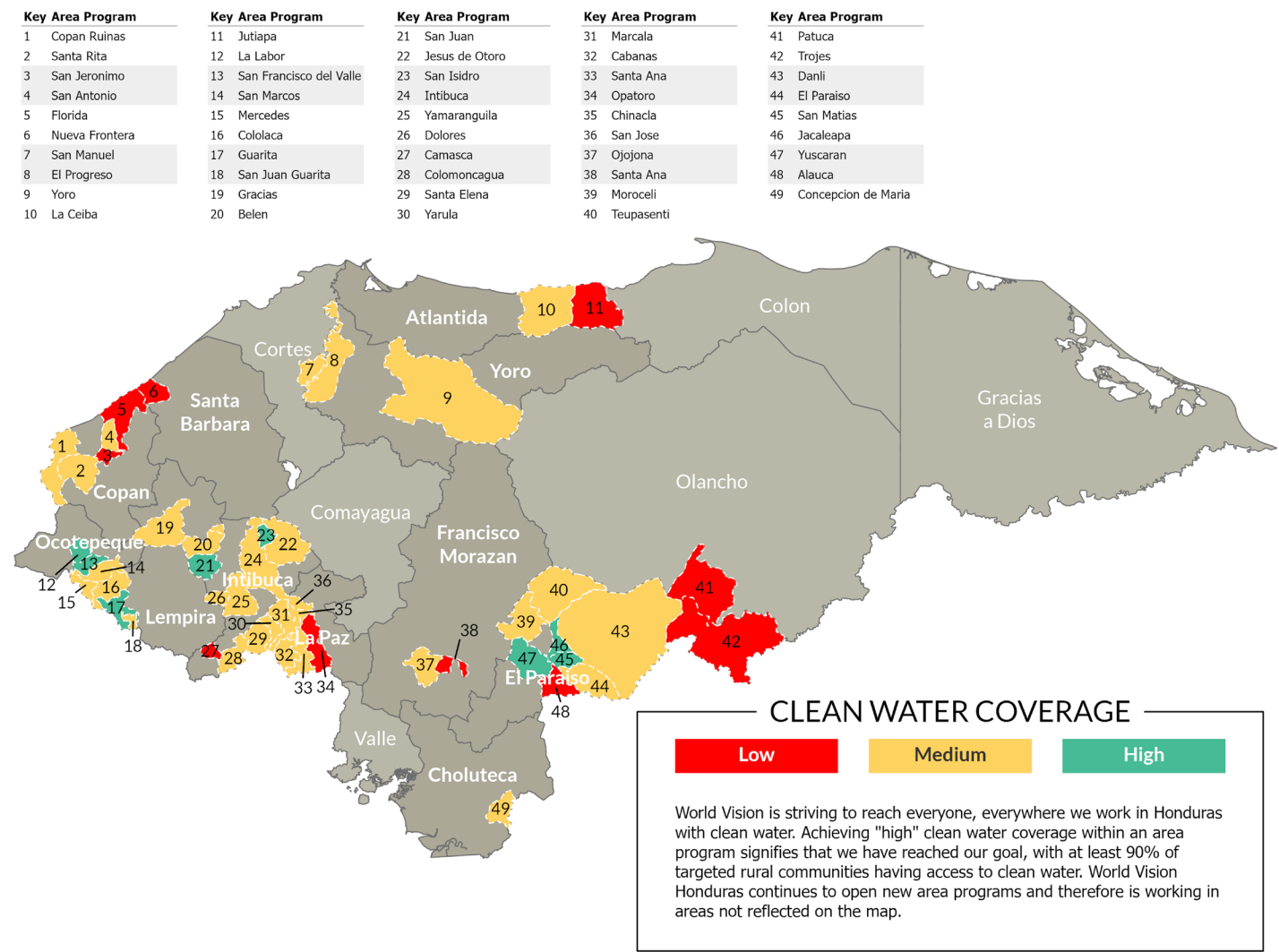
