ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2021 – September 2022 | Rwanda

SUMMARY

As we enter the final year of our push to Finish the Job in Rwanda, we have so much to celebrate and thank God for, including the fact that—through partnership with faithful donors like you—911,874 people now have reliable access to clean water.

We are close to reaching our

most ambitious goal yet: reaching everyone (1 million people), everywhere in World Vision program areas, with access to clean water. As of this report, people in 20 of the 39 areas (sectors) where we work have complete water access. In the remaining 19 areas, we are on track to reach 100% of our goal by the end of FY23.

Toward that end, our team completed 1,953 water points this fiscal year (including 517 household connections), accomplishing 104% of our target, as part of 28 new water supply systems across Rwanda. And we installed water points at 13 health facilities (250% of our annual target) and 52 schools (130% of target).

We also surpassed many goals to improve hygiene practices and access to sanitation. A few highlights include:

- Reaching 119,847 people (126% of target) through community hygiene clubs, faith leaders, and other groups with messages about how to safely manage and store water at home
- Supporting 42,577 households (106% of target) to construct or upgrade their latrines
- Educating 27,721 girls about menstrual hygiene and providing soap and feminine hygiene supplies to 1,000 vulnerable girls
- Creating 145 school hygiene clubs, which promote handwashing; safe use of latrines; clean school environments; and personal, dental, and menstrual hygiene



Eric, 16, visits a water point managed by Eliane (also featured on the next page). Having access to clean water has increased Eric's confidence and his grades. "Because of the dirty water we previously used to wash our clothes, they would become brown, never clean, but now our clothes are washed well. I used to walk a very long distance for water, which made me miss lessons and perform poorly in school. Ever since we got water nearby, I get to school on time," says Eric.



KEY LEARNINGS AND CHALLENGES

During the COVID-19 pandemic, we constructed a large number of piped handwashing stations with motion sensors at health facilities and schools. The sensors prevent wasted water, which can drive up costs and, at times, lead officials to shut off the water. However, the sensors usually need electricity, which can be sporadic in areas where World Vision works. Some of these handwashing stations are now being converted back to traditional sinks with taps. To maintain consistent access to handwashing at schools and health facilities, we are increasing our emphasis on behavior-change campaigns among students and community members, to help conserve water and reduce costs.

PROGRESS TOWARD FINISHING THE JOB



Goal

1 million people gain access to clean drinking water from FY19 through FY23.

Actual

911,874 people gained access to clean drinking water since October 2018, achieving 91% of our target.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

In October, we launched an endline evaluation that includes 100 household surveys in the 39 sectors where we are working to finish the job. The surveys seek to provide evidence that at least 90% of those in program areas can get water within a 30-minute round trip. We also will focus on ensuring long-term sustainability of water and sanitation systems by training and equipping community partners on system maintenance, repairs, and governance (fee collection and operations). And we will continue to work with faith leaders and community groups to implement and monitor sanitation and hygiene behavior-change initiatives.


