ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

October 2021 – September 2022 | Zambia

SUMMARY

We are thrilled to report that the tremendous momentum created by the Finish the Job campaign in Zambia has fostered success across all our program areas. In FY22, we reached the highest number of people in the history of our Zambia Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) Program—230,629, which is an 8% increase over FY21—and surpassed our annual target at 154%. This success can be attributed to constructing 111 solaror electrical grid-powered systems, which is more than twice what we constructed the previous year.

More families have water taps

Our Zambia team increased efforts to bring piped water directly to more families' doorsteps. This led to 2,233 households gaining water taps, an increase of 43% over FY21. Expanding an existing partnership with the Chambeshi Water Utility Company in northern Zambia helped boost those numbers, as did a new partnership with the Western Water and Sanitation Company in Nkeyema district. Through the latter partnership, World Vision built its largest system in Zambia, with a 26,417-gallon tank (10 times the average size in Zambia), which has the capacity to feed 1,500 household taps. Zambia's Vice President W.K. Mutale Nalumango attended the ceremony at which World Vision handed over the system to the community.

Sanitation achievements soar

A record number of communities were declared Open Defecation Free (ODF)—866 against a target of just 250. This is the most communities certified in a single year, and more than double the achievements of the previous two years combined. The entire chiefdom of Chikanta was declared ODF, bringing the total number of chiefdoms declared ODF through World Vision programs since 2014 to eight. Chikanta chiefdom has developed a sustainability plan to ensure that all declared households maintain their ODF status, and Continued on next page


that newly constructed houses are built with basic facilities such as toilets and handwashing stations.

KEY LEARNINGS

Many of our WASH activities were successful thanks to the investment of faith leaders in our work. As trusted voices in their communities, they play a vital role in promoting improved WASH behaviors. In FY22, 466 faith leaders were trained to incorporate sanitation and hygiene messaging into their sermons. They became WASH promoters using the *Jesus: The Source of Living Water* training manual. Practicing what they preach, nine participating churches also added handwashing stations on site.

Another 39 faith and traditional leaders and Community Champions were trained on the Biblical Empowered Worldview model for transforming participants' worldview from one of dependence to one of empowerment and personal responsibility. As individuals grow in their understanding of their worth in God's eyes, they find creative ways to improve their farming methods, increase their incomes, and improve family relationships.

PROGRESS TOWARD FINISHING THE JOB



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Goal

800,000 people gain access to clean drinking water from FY21 through FY25.

Actual

443,903 people gained access to clean drinking water since October 2020, including 230,629 in FY22, achieving 55% of target.

PLANS FOR THE NEXT SIX MONTHS

Upcoming work in FY23 will include:

- The WASH team will ride the impressive momentum of FY22 to start several more construction projects before the rainy season begins. Once the rainy season starts in December, the team will focus on preparing contracts and purchasing for the second half of the year.
- Construction on three new maternity wards that began in FY22 will be completed in the first half of FY23.
- The program will continue to promote microfinance to help more families gain access to the financial resources needed to build WASH facilities.


The Zambia WASH team helped bring clean water to 109 schools in FY22, more than twice the number reached in FY21. The team also constructed pipedwater systems serving 44 health facilities, and helped 52 clinics add handwashing stations and 37 to build latrines. Health facilities also added 53 showers, which now provide mothers with the opportunity to bathe after giving birth.
