# Building strong foundations even in the hardest places

In Lebanon and Jordan, World Vision's education work is focused on early childhood development and includes comprehensive psychological care to help older children in traumatic contexts heal from their experiences.

After discovering gaps in early childhood education among Syrian refugees, staff members began taking these and other steps to fill this critical need:

- Families received homeschooling curriculum, so children can keep getting an education despite overcrowded classrooms
- Schools and early childhood development classrooms were built and furnished with desks, learning resources, play equipment, and toys to stimulate development
- Parents learned how to care for children's development through cognitive play, forming strong bonds through World Vision's Go Baby Go curriculum
- Parents attended ongoing sessions to help reinforce the importance of education in the home
- Children received counseling to improve their emotional well-being



# Making all the difference

Education is the most critical aspect of human development. Children born to a literate mother are 50 percent more likely to survive past the age of 5. Educated mothers are more than twice as likely to send their children to school. Girls with eight years of education are four times less likely to be married young. And just one extra year of schooling can raise an individual's earnings by as much as 10 percent.
